MACA QUARTERLY SUMMARY

The Mid America CropLife Association (MACA) quarterly meetings were held **June 5-6** at the **Hilton** at **the Ballpark Hotel**, **St. Louis**. It was a busy two days!

Twenty-seven people attended the Food Roof Farm and learned about the farm on the roof that is helping to provide food for local neighborhoods and restaurants. The 8,500 square foot rooftop captures up to 17,000 gallons of stormwater per storm event and is also designed to maximize food production while providing a unique community green space and education center. Over 200 varieties of edible plants are grown on the roof and it includes a living wall and hydroponic towers. There's also a shaded and multi-functional community hub space, state of the art greenhouse, and chicken house with a green roof.







Linda Froelich, FMC, provided an update on their sustainability program. She shared how it was developed as well as how they are reviewing what has been accomplished.





Committee meetings were held Wednesday afternoon for the Annual Meeting, D&E, Industry Communication and Production & Environmental Stewardship (PES) where the members work on programs to benefit members as well as heard from speakers.

Ten first time attendees participated in a special welcome session to learn about MACA and meet the board officers and committee chairs.

The Cardinals baseball game got off to a great start with the singing of the National Anthem, but then the rain came and the game was delayed and then postponed until August 31. But the 38 MACA attendees didn't miss a beat - they ate and chatted for nearly two hours. One of the best networking sessions ever!



The Board met on Thursday morning and took the following actions:

- Approved The Pesticide Waste Disposal Flowchart developed by the MACA D&E Committee with input from the industry.
- Approved developing "fun facts" of consumer agriculture for annual meeting reception in Indianapolis. The PES committee will create 20-25 slides that will make people take notice and laugh at what they can take home and share with others to explain what agriculture is doing and why is it important.
- Approved Taylor-Cain Corporation as an allied member with Taylor Jackson as the contact.
- Approved the 2020 annual meeting hotel site for September 8-10 at the Marriott Grand Hotel, St. Louis, MO.

- Sustainability Forum for Tuesday, November 5-Wednesday November 6 was reviewed.
- Reviewed the membership survey John Mattingly, AgMatrix, had conducted this spring and President Edsten shared some of the key points with the group. There will be more on this at the November meeting.
- Approved the 2018 Financial Review prepared by Joe Filla, Filla & Filla, CPAs.

STATE UPDATES




ILLINOIS - "The Illinois legislature adjourned for the year with no significant legislation on pesticide use," writes **Jean Payne**, **President**, **Illinois Fertilizer & Chemical Association (IFCA)**. There were bills introduced to increase penalty amounts within the IL Pesticide Act, and also legislation to restrict use of neonic pesticides on state owned property, but none of these bills advanced. The priority of this year's session was a Capitol budget including many tax increases to fund a statewide infrastructure projects and education. That bill passed, as did raising the minimum wage, expanding gambling and legalizing recreational marijuana. We expect near year will be a major year for environmental legislation.

The Illinois Department of Ag has extended the cut-off date for dicamba application to soybean to July 15, 2019 due to the delayed planting season.

Corn and soybeans that were planted need some heat. Illinois may set a record for prevent plant acres. In Illinois, 88% of corn was planted and 70% of soybeans at the time of this report.

As for the 4th, **Payne** says "Everyone is hoping for sunshine, although there is concern that expected hot temperatures will coincide with the majority of dicamba application on soybeans."



KANSAS - "In 2019, the Kansas legislature passed legislation to allow the Kansas department of agriculture to monitor and regulate the commercial production of industrial hemp in accordance with the 2018 Farm Bill. Kansas expects to see growth in the ag sector from this new crop," says Randy E. Stookey, Senior Vice President, General Counsel, Kansas

Agribusiness Retailers Association.

KARA has submitted an industry letter of support to the Kansas department of agriculture requesting approval of a special local needs registration under section 24(c) of FIFRA with regard to the application of Dicamba herbicide, due to certain conditions that present a specific and special local need in Kansas. The special local needs registration would allow application of Dicamba on cotton up to 90 days after planting; and, for soybeans, application up to 60 days after planting and/or the R1 growth stage, whichever comes first. KARA is waiting to hear back from the department on this request.

As of June 18th, 74% of Kansas soybeans had been planted, against 93% this same time last year, and 82% on the 5 year average. Kansas corn was very late being planted, and corn condition is being reported as 42% good, compared to 51% good on the 5 year average.



MICHIGAN - "There's very little action at the capitol...some conversation about pollinators, glyphosate and dicamba, but nothing serious," reports **Jim Byrum**, **President**, **Michigan Agri-Business Association**. "And no new regulations."

Field work is done, there's a few dry beans yet to plant, but overall about 20% of corn intended didn't get planted, and the same percentage for soybeans...and the crops that did get planted look pretty poor...yield will be a problem.

Byrum, the eternal optimist says he'll be "Hanging at Lake Michigan and hopefully enjoying warm, sunny weather for the 4th!



MINNESOTA - "The Legislature adjourned until 2020," says Bill Bond, Executive Director, MN Crop Production Retailers, "and all is well."

MN's new Groundwater Protection Rule (GPR) became effective June 24, 2019. The GPR will reduce the risk of nitrate from fertilizer impacting groundwater in areas of the state where soils are prone to leaching and where drinking water supplies are threatened. Nitrate is one of the most common contaminants in Minnesota's groundwater; elevated nitrate levels in drinking water

can pose serious health concerns for humans. The Minnesota Department of Agriculture (MDA) will oversee implementation of the rule. Beginning in 2020, use of nitrogen fertilizer in the fall and on frozen soils will be restricted in areas of the state with vulnerable groundwater, such as areas with coarse textured soil, shallow bedrock, or karst geology, and in public wellhead areas - known as Drinking Water Supply Management Areas (DWSMAs) - with elevated nitrate levels. The GPR outlines a multi-level approach involving local farmers and agronomists working to mitigate nitrate losses in DWSMAs with high nitrate in groundwater. Farmers in a DWSMA would be subject to four levels of mitigation which move from voluntary to regulatory. A local advisory team, consisting primarily of producers and agriculture professionals, will advise the MDA regarding appropriate response activities for the area and support implementation of these activities. The Groundwater Protection Rule is part of the state's overall Nitrogen Fertilizer Management Plan (NFMP) which was developed with broad stakeholder input over a five year period and implemented in 2015. As for field work, it is wet but finally finishing.

WISCONSIN - "On June 25-26, the Republican controlled Wisconsin State Assembly and Senate passed a two year \$81 billion budget, and sent it to Democratic Governor Tony Evers," says Tom Bressner, Executive Director, Wisconsin Agri-Business Association. "As of this writing, we have no idea if he will sign it, veto it, or line item veto it. Perhaps the biggest news for agriculture in the proposed budget is \$8.8 million to create a Dairy Innovation Hub to help the ailing dairy industry in Wisconsin. The

Hub will incorporate researchers from three Wisconsin universities, charging them in new product development and marketing initiatives."

As for regulations, Bressner says not legislatively, but more to come from the regulatory side. Water quality is a huge topic in Wisconsin, with lots of fingers pointed at the dairy industry.

Field work for the most part, what is going to get planted has finally been planted. Most fields have small ponded areas that did not get planted. There is a lot of summer left, so the potential for a good crop is still here... as long we get lots of heating units and can hold off until late October for our first frost. That is asking for a lot

Finally, last week, Bressner got a 5.2 inch rain, that combined with all the rain we already had, caused my finished basement to become a two inch deep pond. I am hoping to finish the clean up by the 4th. Sounds fun, doesn't it?

WATER ISSUES

"Water runoff from production agriculture is generally considered "nonpoint" discharges and exempt from EPA's permit program," says **MACA Water Consultant Steve Taylor**. However, groundwater issues have begun to creep into

the agricultural world. EPA has been looking into whether permits may be needed for pollutant discharges that originate from groundwater or subsurface water. The U.S. Supreme Court is also considering a case regrading this issue.

In April 2019, EPA filed notice requesting public comment on its interpretive statement 'Discharges of Pollutants via a Direct Hydrologic Connection to Surface Water'. The Federal Water Quality Coalition (FWQC), of which MACA is a member, has responded and filed comments to EPA. As a general comment, we agree with EPA in that EPA's permitting program does not cover releases to groundwater even if that groundwater eventually connects to a surface waterbody. If circumstances change (i.e. an unfavorable Supreme Court ruling) which force EPA to consider permitting releases to groundwater, the technical issues involved in tracing and regulating pollutant releases to and through the soil, then to

groundwater, and finally to surface water would be immense. In this situation, we commented that massive new regulations (not just amendments to current regulations), subjected to public comment, would be required.

MACA will continue to stay engaged on this priority issue and continue to keep you informed.
